

Website Coding

- The following variables are coded for every single website in all project datasets.
 - **SRCHCLM** identifies the specific issue industry whose search terms were used in Google to identify the site for sampling. This variable has a range of 01 to 20, with each value representing a unique issue area. For example, sites collected under the Abortion/Reproductive Rights issue area are coded SRCHCLM=01, sites collected under the Civil Liberties issue area are coded SRCHCLM=02, and so on. For a complete list of these SRCHCLM codes, please see Appendix A.
 - **COLLRD** identifies both the year in which the site was archived and whether it is panel or cross section data. This variable has a range of 1-9, with each value representing a unique dataset. The first collection round, denoted as COLLRD=1, serves as both panel and cross section data for 2006, the first year of the project. In all subsequent years, panel and cross sectional datasets are represented by different values. Each year, raw online data was collected in September (although in two cases, went a few days into October because of computing difficulties).
 - 1 = Data Collection 1, 2006 Panel and Cross-section
 - 2 = Data Collection 2, 2007 Panel
 - 3 = Data Collection 3, 2007 Cross-Section
 - 4 = Data Collection 4, 2008 Panel
 - 5 = Data Collection 5, 2008 Cross-Section
 - 6 = Data Collection 6, 2009 Panel
 - 7 = Data Collection 7, 2009 Cross-Section
 - 8 = Data Collection 8, 2010 Panel
 - 9 = Data Collection 9, 2010 Cross Section
 - **WEBID** serves as the primary identifier for each website in the sample. The first two digits of each 5 digit WEBID consist of the site's SRCHCLM and are followed by three more digits. For instance, a WEBID of 01044 would have a SRCHCLM of 01 and a WEBID of 20104 would have a SRCHCLM of 20.
 - **HOMEPAGE** provides the URL or web address of the page that has been identified as the highest order page for a unique author or coherent group of contributors. The homepage is defined as the highest order page for a unique author or coherent group of contributors. For instance, if the assigned page is http://jearl.faculty.arizona.edu/internet_and_activism_lab/ the homepage can be accessed by typing <http://jearl.faculty.arizona.edu/> into a browser. Any shorter URL address (e.g., <http://arizona.edu/>) would retrieve pages that were authored by someone other than Jennifer Earl. Data coded for each record, identified by the WEBID, come from the homepage and all of its lower order pages that are produced by the same author or coherent group of contributors.
 - **ASSIGNED PAGE** provides the URL or web address of the page that was initially reached as the result of the search claim's Google search. Multiple assigned pages may exist if multiple sampled results for the same search claim shared a common homepage.
 - **DUPLCT** is a dummy variable that when coded as 1 signifies that the same website was also coded under a different WEBID in the same collection round in a different SRCHCLM. Coding

will not be identical across the duplicated cases because each will be adjusted to accommodate data from the assigned pages related to the SRCHCLM of the WEBID.

- **MASTERID** is only coded if DUPLCT is 1, in which case it contains the WEBID of the duplicate site that was coded first.
- **PROTDUM** classifies or categorizes the general purpose or function of the site, as well as its relevance to protest and advocacy. The variable can receive a value a code of 0 through 6, or a 9. Sites with no content relevant to protest are coded 0. Sites that contain content relevant to protest but are not engaged in or encouraging advocacy themselves receive a code from 1 to 6, depending on the site's function. Sites that do actually contain protest content receive a code of 9. Sites are considered to have protest content if they *appeal* for change-oriented action on behalf of specific, articulated claims. That is, does the site make claims?
 - 0 = Nothing relevant to protest on this site
 - 1 = Commercial site with no protest content
 - 2 = Government site with no protest content
 - 3 = Education site with no protest content
 - 4 = News only site
 - 5 = Listserv with no protest content
 - 6 = Organization site, NEC, with no protest content
 - 9 = There WAS non-news protest content

For PROTDUM=1, commercial sites include sites devoted to sales or marketing that do not explicitly make claims or call for action but relate to content of interest to this project. An example would be a Barnes & Noble page on a book about abortion politics. For PROTDUM=2, government sites include sites such as the UN Council for Human Rights where the issue of human rights is discussed, but no claims or calls for action are present. For PROTDUM=3, education sites include committees or organizations based out of universities, course syllabi, etc. For PROTDUM=4, news only sites include sites run by newspapers (such as nytimes.com). PROTDUM=5 includes any posted email lists or listserv content. For PROTDUM=6, organization sites include foundations or other non-profits. This does not include organizations that could fit in other categories here (e.g., for schools, code 3; for for-profit companies, code 1; etc.). PROTDUM=9 includes all sites where claims are made and/or actions are called for.

It is important to note that for sites with a PROTDUM of 0, no other data is coded, except for the variable **NOPROT**, which is used to provide a description of the site if no other codable data is found. Additionally, all variables coded for websites with a PROTDUM of 1-6 are coded for websites with a PROTDUM of 9. However, websites with a PROTDUM of 9 will also have additional data coded, as will be discussed further on.

- The following variables are coded for all sites, except if PROTDUM=0.
 - **ST_MON, ST_YEAR** record the month and year that the site was created or started, if the date is available. If only the start year was available, ST_YEAR was coded and ST_MON was left blank. For blogs this variable is used to capture the oldest archive date for posts if no start date is listed elsewhere.

- **UP_MON, UP_YEAR** record the month and year that the site was most recently updated, if the date is available. If only the start year was available, UP_YEAR was coded and UP_MONTH was left blank.
- **MONMIR** is a dummy variable coded as 1 when a site's most recent update (coded in UP_MON and UP_YEAR) occurred in the month and year the site was archived, which is September for each year of data collection.
- **CAUSE1-CAUSE6** are variables used to capture the causes/claims of the website. These fields are used to code claims that the site takes a position on and/or endorses and reflect the main claims of the site overall. The codes and their corresponding causes can be found in Appendix B.
 - **VAL1-VAL6:** indicates whether the valence of each CAUSE1-CAUSE6 is pro, anti, or undetermined.
 - **LOC1-LOC6** indicates whether each CAUSE1-CAUSE6 is domestic or international.
 - **IDLCAUSE1-6** is used if the most applicable cause/claim code does not fully capture the cause/claim of the site. In these cases, ideal phrasing for the claim will be entered.
 - **CAUSES** is a dummy variable coded as 1 if there are more than six causes/claims found on the site.
 - **LISTCLMS** is used to list additional causes/claims if CAUSE1-CAUSE6 have already been filled.
- **NEWS** indicates whether the site contains news, information, and/or educational materials. Claims are considered news claims if at least one of the following characteristics is true: (1) they are found in content specifically called news or articles and/or have a byline; (2) if the site does not appear to be taking a position in relation to the reported cause.
- **SPECNEWS** indicates whether the site contains news content that is specialized, or focused on a specific group of causes.
- **TACTNEWS** indicates if there is reporting on protest that demonstrates no explicit or implicit support for participation.
- **NCAUSE1-NCAUSE4** record the cause or claim of the news content, if present. These fields are used to code claims for which the site provides news, information, or educational materials, but does *not* advocate for or against. The codes and their corresponding causes can be found in Appendix B.
 - **NVAL1-NVAL4:** indicates whether the valence of each NCAUSE1-NCAUSE6 is pro, anti, or undetermined.
 - **HIST1-HIST4** indicates whether the relevant cause is in reference to historical protest, or protest that took place before 1990
 - **NLOC1-NLOC4** indicates whether each NCAUSE1-NCAUSE6 is domestic or international
 - **NIDLCAUSE1-4** is used if the most applicable cause/claim code does not fully capture the news cause/claim of the site. In these cases, ideal phrasing for the news claim will be entered.

- **PRIV1** is a dummy variable coded 1 if the site has a privacy policy.
- **NOTES** contains any additional information relevant to the record's coding that is not captured by the variables above.
- The following variables are coded only for sites with PROTNUM=9, or sites that engage in advocacy and/or call for protest actions.
 - **INDYSITE** determines the extent to which a site is independent of causes or connected to one (or more), based on how the site describes itself and the type of content it posts in relation to causes.
 - **POLIDUM** specifies the extent to which protest content on the site focuses on political issues as opposed to issues outside of the realm of politics. Responses range from protest content with no political focus, some political focus, or a total political focus.
 - **NONPOLI** describes the site's advocacy-oriented content if it is not completely politically focused, as indicated by POLIDUM. This type of content is often oriented towards the entertainment industry and pop culture figures.
 - **BLOG** identifies whether the site is a blog, contains a blog nested in its structure, or has no blog whatsoever. Blogs are defined as regularly updated accounts produced by single authors (or a regularly contributing, specific group of authors) in a diary-like, chronologically ordered format.
 - **WHDUM** indicates whether the homepage was found on a warehouse site, which is a domain that provides the backend functionality of the page (e.g., the URL, server space, online applications) and the protest-related application (e.g., the applet to sign a petition) but is independent of the page's content. There are a small number of sites that were determined to be warehouse sites and one can create a list of those by listing WHSITE for each year.
 - **WSITE** is used to identify the URL of the warehouse site that the homepage was found on if WHDUM indicates that the site is indeed a warehouse site.
 - **DIRECTRY**: is a dummy variable showing whether the site is a directory, or a list of links to other sites, with little to no additional content.
 - **HUMAUTH** is a dummy variable used to determine if the site is created by a human author or is a web crawler, like a Google search response page. The vast majority of sites in the dataset have a human author.
 - **MULTAUT** is a dummy variable used to indicate whether a site has a single author or definable group of authors, as opposed to having multiple unique authors. Sites with multiple unique authors are generally message boards, discussion forums, and listservs.
 - **MEMBER** is a dummy variable identifying whether the site is accessible to the public or requires users to register or log in.

- **SMONAMED** indicates whether or not the site mentions the names of social movement organizations (SMOs). An SMO is any organization that exists beyond the website itself, usually with an offline office, that has a history of advocacy-oriented activity.
 - **SMONUM** provides a count of the SMOs named on the site.
 - **SMONAME1-SMONAME4** are used to record the names of SMOs mentioned on the site.
 - **SMOREL1-SMOREL4** are used to record the website's relationship with those SMOs. These include negative, neutral, and positive relationships between the site and SMO, as well as site affiliation with the SMO.

- **MVMTDUM** indicates whether or not the site is explicitly affiliated with a social movement. This means that the site must contain specific language of affiliation, which can include references to a collective history of activism.
 - **MVMT1-MVMT4** is used to identify which particular social movements the site is affiliated with, if MVMTDUM is coded positively. Please see Appendix C for a complete list of these social movement codes.

- **SITEPROD** identifies the website's producer, which is the organization or individual responsible for getting the site to the internet. For a complete list of possible site producers, please see Appendix D. We thank Kristen Foot and Steven Schneider for allowing us to adapt this variable from their prior data collections.

- **GETINFO** indicates whether the site allows users to get reasonably verifiable information about its SRCHCLM, and if so, whether this information is available on the site, off the site through links, or both. We thank Kristen Foot and Steven Schneider for allowing us to adapt this variable from their prior data collections.

- **PROVINFO** indicates whether the site allows users to provide information about its SRCHCLM, and if so, whether this provision of information is made possible on the site, off the site through links, or both. We thank Kristen Foot and Steven Schneider for allowing us to adapt this variable from their prior data collections.

- **EXPRESS** indicates whether the site allows users to express themselves about its SRCHCLM, and if so, whether this expression is made possible on the site, off the site through links, or both. We thank Kristen Foot and Steven Schneider for allowing us to adapt this variable from their prior data collections.

- **ADVOCACY** indicates whether the site allows users to engage in activism about its SRCHCLM, and if so, whether this activism is encouraged on the site, off the site through links, or both. We thank Kristen Foot and Steven Schneider for allowing us to adapt this variable from their prior data collections.

- **PERSONACT** is a dummy variable used to determine whether personal/private actions, which aren't considered protest actions, are mentioned on the site. These actions include volunteering and starting community groups.

- **SITEACT** is a dummy variable used to determine if the site contains actual protest actions.

- The following variables are only coded for sites with PROTDUM=9 and SITEACT=1. This means that these sites encourage or facilitate participation in specific protest actions. These variables are meant to categorize and count these specific protest actions. Generally, actions that are documented on the site and which the site seems to endorse or to encourage participation in (or for events that have already taken place, the site endorses prior participation) are considered tactics. Actions that are public events and/or for which participation is open to the public are considered tactics. For a list of types of tactic, see Appendices E and F.

All protest actions are categorized as one of the following prior to coding:

- Offline tactics are those that require co-presence with other individuals for participation.
- Internal online tactics are those that do not require co-presence and in which the user can participate/get all information necessary for participation without leaving the initial site's domain.
- External online tactics are those that do not require co-presence and for which the user must follow links to outside domains in order to gather all key information needed to participate.
- Calendar tactics are those that are found in calendar format, either in a list organized by date of occurrence (month and year or year alone) or in a table that looks like a calendar page, and are not specifically labeled "archive." Tactics in date-organized format on blogs and listservs are also considered calendar tactics. Calendar tactics may be either offline or online in form.
- Archived tactics are those labeled "archive" or "past" and may be either offline or online in form.

For additional clarification on these different categories of tactics and relevant variables coded, please refer to screenshot of the coding database in Appendix G.

- The following variables are coded under each of the five categories above for each protest action found on the site and can be distinguished from one another in the dataset with unique prefixes. For instance DUM is coded as STDUM for offline tactics, IEDUM for internal online tactics, XEDUM for external online tactics, CALDUM for calendar tactics, and ARDUM for archived tactics. Please note that calendar tactics were only coded in Data Collection Rounds 2 through 9. Additionally, in an attempt to capture only upcoming and current events, the calendar tactics coded are limited to protest actions during the month that the site was archived and all months thereafter.
 - **DUM** is a dummy variable that indicates whether protest actions in each of the above categories are discussed on the site.
 - **FORMS** provides counts of the number of different protest forms discussed on the site within each category. A site encouraging participation in an offline rally as well as participation in a separate offline march would be coded FORMS=2.
 - **FORM1-FORM5** is used to record each tactic type that serve as the count for the FORMS variable. If a site encourages participation in an offline rally and a separate offline march, FORM1 would receive a code for rally and FORM2 would receive a code for march.
 - **_CNT** gives a count for each tactic type listed in FORM1-FORM5. If a site encourages participation in an offline rally and a separate offline march, the _CNT for FORM1 would be 1 and the _CNT for FORM2 would be 1 as well.
 - **LIST** is used to name any other tactical forms in the category that don't fit into Form1-FORM5.

- **PRIV** describes the site's privacy policy regarding each of the tactic categories. If privacy policies differ between tactics within the same category, the most common privacy policy is coded, with an accompanying note. Codes for this variable are as follows:
 - 0 = No privacy policy
 - 1 = Participation was anonymous
 - 2 = Participation was private to the site
 - 3 = Participation was private to the site and site friends
 - 4 = Participation was completely public
 - 5 = Other/None of the above
- **NOTES** contains any additional information relevant to the record's coding that is not captured by the variables above.

Tactic Coding

- The following variables represent a different unit of analysis than the ones above. Whereas the variables listed above are all coded from websites, the following variables are coded from the specific online and offline protest actions linked to or hosted by those websites. Essentially, each observation coded for the following variables is an instance of protest facilitated or promoted by a website.

All of the tactics classified as offline, internal online, external online, and calendar are coded as individual records, with data collected on the variables listed below. The total number of tactics coded from each website, identified by its WEBID, is essentially the sum of values found in STDUM, IEDUM, XEDUM, and CALDUM, described above. However, in very rare cases, the sum of these values may not equal the exact number of tactics coded from the corresponding record. These rare cases include situations such as the presence of a tactic being identified, but without enough additional information for further coding.

- **TACT_ID** is an 8-digit number that serves as the primary identifier for each tactic record. The first five of these eight digits are the same as the WEBID of the site on which the tactic was hosted or from which it was linked to. The last three digits serve as unique identifiers for each protest action coded under that site.
- **TACTURL** provides the URL, or web address, on which the tactic was found.
- **EXINDEX** identifies whether the tactic is classified as offline, internal online, or external online. Note that for this variable, calendar tactics will be re-classified into one of these three categories.
- **CALDUM** is a dummy variable, coded by determining whether or not the tactic is classified as a calendar tactic.
- **DTMISS** identifies whether data required for complete coding is missing. When variable is coded in the affirmative, additional relevant information can be found in the NOTES field.
- **TACTIC** classifies the type of protest action being coded. Coders used the underlying mechanism of participation to code this variable, even if the tactic was represented differently (see MISMTCH). Please see Appendix E and F for a list of all TACTIC codes. It is important to note that for offline tactics, two or more concurrent forms (such as a rally and

demonstration) would be coded by listing both in this variable, separated by a space. However, if a webpage called for someone to email, call, fax, and write a physical letter to a target on a specific cause, those would be coded as four independent tactics because it would be possible to participate in any of the four without the others. Users who want to reduce the data by pushing these tactics into the same campaign may do so by combining records that share TACTURL and identical claims and targets info, such that record only differs by TACTIC.

- **MISMTCH** is a dummy variable that indicates if there is a mismatch between what the webpage calls the tactic and what actual tactic mechanism is observed. For example, if the page contains a statement the user could sign in support (i.e., mechanism of a petition), but calls the action a “boycott,” MISMTCH is coded 1.
- **MMDESC** describes the nature of the mismatch if MISMTCH=1. For the example above, the MISMTCH field could say “called boycott but provides statement to sign.” In this case, the TACTIC coding would reflect a petition because people signed to support, but MISMTCH would be 1 with the above note.
- **ST_MON, ST_YEAR** record the month and year that the tactic was created or started, if the date is available. If only the start year is available, ST_YEAR is coded and ST_MON is left blank.
- **UP_MON, UP_YEAR** record the month and year that the tactic was most recently updated, if the date is available. If only the start year is available, UP_YEAR is coded and UP_MONTH is left blank.
- **POLIDUM** specifies the extent to which the call for the tactic focuses on political issues as opposed to issues outside of the realm of politics. Responses range from protest content with no political focus, some political focus, or a total political focus.
- **NONPOLI** describes the tactic’s content if it is not completely politically focused, as indicated by POLIDUM. This type of content is often oriented towards the entertainment industry and pop culture figures.
- **COMPLTTA**: identifies when the tactic takes place. Options range from:
 - 1 = Recently completed (w/in 1 year)
 - 2 = Long completed (>1 year)
 - 3 = Ongoing
 - 4 = Upcoming
 - 5 = Unclear/cannot be determined
- **SMODUM** is a dummy variable used to indicate whether the tactic is explicitly affiliated with an SMO.
- **MVMTDUM** is a dummy variable that indicates whether the tactic is explicitly affiliated with a social movement. All records coded in the affirmative for SMODUM, are automatically coded in the affirmative for MVMTDUM.

- **CAUSE1-CAUSE8** are variables used to capture the causes/claims of the tactic. These fields are used to code claims that the tactic is meant to support or oppose. The same cause codes may be used more than once in a tactic record if that tactic has multiple, distinct targets. For instance, a boycott of Pepsi and the US government for environment reasons would take two cause-target combos to code: an environment code with a corporate target and an environment cause code with a government target. If this same tactic also included LGBT claims it would require 4 combos, 2 more cause/target combos would be included as well: and LGBT claim with a corporate target and LGBT claim with a government target. The codes and their corresponding causes can be found in Appendix B.
 - **VAL1-VAL8** indicate whether the valence of each CAUSE1-CAUSE8 is pro, anti, or undetermined.
 - **GOVTARG1-GOVTARG8** identify whether the target of each CAUSE1-CAUSE8 is a government entity. Potential coding for this variable includes:
 - 1 = The target was a government entity
 - 2 = The target was a quasi-government entity
 - 3 = The target was a private entity
 - 4 = Other
 - **TARG1-TARG8** identify the intended target of each CAUSE1-CAUSE8. Codes for these targets can be found in Appendix H.
 - **TLEV1-TLEV8** is used to determine the level at which each TAG1-TARG8 operates. This variable can be coded as follows:
 - 1 = Target for cause is local
 - 2 = Target for cause is at the state level
 - 3 = Target for cause is at the US regional level
 - 4 = Target for cause is at the US national level
 - 5 = Target for cause is a foreign entity
 - 6 = Target for cause is the relation between the US and a foreign entity
 - 7 = Target for cause is international
 - 8 = Other
 - **IDLCAUSE1-8** is used if the most applicable cause/claim code does not fully capture the cause/claim of the tactic. In these cases, ideal phrasing for the claim will be entered.
 - **CAUSES** is a dummy variable coded as 1 if there are more than eight causes/claims addressed by the tactic.
 - **LISTCLMS** is used to list additional causes/claims if CAUSE1-CAUSE8 have already been filled
- **CLKOPT** indicates whether the tactic provides additional protest opportunities that target the same entity regarding the same cause/claim, with one mouse-click. For example, if a site says “Fill out this form to sign our petition, and click here to also send a fax,” CLICKOPT=1.
- **CLKDESC** describes the 1-click opportunities when CLKOPT=1. In these instances, this field contains the tactical form, claim(s), and target(s) of the 1-click opportunity.
- **PARTICD** identifies how the number of participants in the protest tactic is determined. Potential codes for this variable include:
 - 1 = Don’t know number of participants
 - 2 = Number of participants are reported by the site hosting the tactic

3 = Number of participants are estimated, based on pictures, video, or other types of information provided by the site.

- **PARTICES** provides the *estimated* count of participants. This field is left blank unless PARTICD=3. If PARTICD does equal 3, the variable can be coded as follows:
 - 1 = 1-9 participants
 - 2 = 10-49 participants
 - 3 = 50-99 participants
 - 4 = 100-499 participants
 - 5 = 500-999 participants
 - 6 = 1,000-4,999 participants
 - 7 = 5,000-9,999 participants
 - 8 = 10,000+ participants

- **PARTICEX** provides the count of participants, as reported by the site on which the tactic is found. This field is left blank unless PARTICD=2.

- **CONTOUT** indicates the extent to which contact information necessary for participating in the tactic is available on the page. CONTOUT for offline tactics is based on information about the location of the offline tactic. For online tactics, CONTOUT applies to contact information for the target or other intermediary required for complete participation. Possible codes for this variable include:
 - 1 = All required contact info available on page
 - 2 = Some required contact info available on page
 - 3 = None of the required contact info available on page
 - 4 = Don't need contact info to participate / Not applicable

- **VIRTUAL** describes the degree to which tactic participation takes place online or offline. Relevant codes include the following:
 - 1 = Participation is ENTIRELY VIRTUAL
 - 2 = Participation is MOSTLY VIRTUAL
 - 3 = Participation is MOSTLY OFFLINE
 - 4 = Participation is ENTIRELY OFFLINE

If an internet connection is required for all aspects of participation, participation is coded entirely virtual (1). If an internet connection is required for most, but not all, aspects of participation, participation is coded mostly virtual (2). If an internet connection is required, but only for a small part of participation, participation is coded mostly offline (3). For example, faxing is coded as mostly offline. If no internet connection is required for participation, participation is coded entirely offline (4). This was coded when one could be reasonably expected to be able to stumble upon or otherwise be able to find and participate in the action if the website didn't exist. Even if action took place offline, if one could not reasonably be expected to stumble upon or locate the event without the webpage (e.g., a faxing campaign), the tactic would be coded as a 3.

- **ST_NOTES** is used only if the tactic is an online tactic. It describes any notable offline participation regarding an online tactic.

- **REGREQ** is a dummy variable indicating whether users are required to register in order to participate in the protest action. This variable is only coded in the affirmative if there is explicit language of registration (e.g., requires ID, password, etc.).
- **AUTOTASK** is used to identify the level of automation of the backend of participation. The variable uses the following codes:
 - 1 = Participation was automated
 - 2 = Participation was semi-automated
 - 3 = Participation was manual
 - 4 = Format of participation could not be determined

If participation is complete simply by furnishing the website with information (e.g.: type in name, address, and e-mail), participation is automated (1). If participation is partially completed by the website (e.g.: site formats a letter based on information the user provides) but requires the user to perform additional tasks (e.g.: print and mail letter), participation is semi-automated (2). If participation must be completed entirely by the user (e.g.: type the letter or e-mail and personally send it), participation is manual (3). It is important here to note the distinction between VIRTUAL and AUTOTASK. Whereas VIRTUAL identifies to extent to which the Internet is required for a user in order to participate, AUTOTASK identifies the extent to which a website reduces the effort requirements of tactic participation.
- **NOTES** contains any additional information relevant to the tactic record's coding that is not captured by the variables above.

200 Letter-writing (“open letters” are not considered tactics and should not be coded)

250 Send a message (tactics should contain specific language instructing the user to “send a message” and should NOT contain any additional information about the mechanism that would allow the coder to determine a different tactical form)

300 E-mailing

325 Twitter/Tweet regarding target (requires use of hashtags or direct links to automatically Tweet or Re-Tweet)

350 Post comment to social networking site (excludes becoming a fan; allows becoming a fan and then using that access to comment)

400 Boycott of online entities

To be online, the boycott must be of an online entity, its website, or web presence; e.g., a boycott of Nike’s physical stores should be coded as 410, a boycott of their webstore should be coded as 400, a boycott of both should be coded as two tactics: one with tactic form of 410 and the other with tactic form of 400.

410 Boycott of offline entities

An offline boycott is an organized refusal to buy or use a product or service, refusal to cross picket lines, rent strikes, walking out, refusing to post bond when arrested. To be coded here, the thing being boycotted must have a physical presence that is being avoided (a physical, not web, store).

500 Faxing

550 Phone calling (where participants are doing this alone and not in interaction with others)

600 Denial of service attack

700 Malicious code
